Disappointed with Hope?
Luke 24

We want to have hope, but often times at worst we're hopeless and at best we're optimistic. But hopelessness isn't satisfying and optimism doesn't work. What if we could have a hope that does not disappoint? The resurrection of Jesus guarantees us a hope that cannot and will not disappoint.

The resurrection of Jesus means we don't have to be hopeless; we don't have to settle for optimism; we can be hopeful.

- As you reflect on the message, what stood out to you? What is something you are still thinking about?
- What is something from the message that challenged you? How are you wrestling with that challenge?
- What question(s) do you have from the message?
- What is at least one practical takeaway from the message?

Luke 24:1-35

But on the first day of the week, at early dawn, they went to the tomb, taking the spices they had prepared. **2** And they found the stone rolled away from the tomb, **3** but when they went in they did not find the body of the Lord Jesus. **4** While they were perplexed about this, behold, two men stood by them in dazzling apparel. **5** And as they were frightened and bowed their faces to the ground, the men said to them, "Why do you seek the living among the dead? **6** He is not here, but has risen. Remember how he told you, while he was still in Galilee, **7** that the Son of Man must be delivered into the hands of sinful men and be crucified and on the third day rise." **8** And they remembered his words, **9** and returning from the tomb they told all these things to the eleven and to all the rest. **10** Now it was Mary Magdalene and Joanna and Mary the mother of James and the other women with them who told these things to the apostles, **11** but these words seemed to them an idle tale, and they did not believe them. **12** But Peter rose and ran to the tomb; stooping and looking in, he saw the linen cloths by themselves; and he went home marveling at what had happened.

13 That very day two of them were going to a village named Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, **14** and they were talking with each other about all these things that had happened. **15** While they were talking and discussing together, Jesus himself drew near and went with them. **16** But their eyes were kept from recognizing him. **17** And he said to them, "What is this conversation that you are holding with each other as you walk?" And they stood still, looking sad. **18** Then one of them, named Cleopas, answered him, "Are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who does not know the things that have happened there in these days?" **19** And he said to them, "What things?" And they said to him, "Concerning Jesus of Nazareth, a man who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, **20** and how our chief priests and rulers delivered him up to be condemned to death, and crucified him. **21** But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things happened. **22** Moreover, some women of our company amazed us. They were at the tomb early in the morning, **23** and when they did not find his body, they came back saying that they had even seen a vision of angels, who said that he was alive. **24** Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said, but him they did not see." **25** And he said to them, "O foolish ones, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken! **26** Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?" **27** And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he interpreted to them in all the Scriptures the things concerning himself.

28 So they drew near to the village to which they were going. He acted as if he were going farther, **29** but they urged him strongly, saying, "Stay with us, for it is toward evening and the day is now far spent." So he went in to stay with them. **30** When he was at table with them, he took the bread and blessed and broke it and gave it to

them. **31** And their eyes were opened, and they recognized him. And he vanished from their sight. **32** They said to each other, “Did not our hearts burn within us while he talked to us on the road, while he opened to us the Scriptures?” **33** And they rose that same hour and returned to Jerusalem. And they found the eleven and those who were with them gathered together, **34** saying, “The Lord has risen indeed, and has appeared to Simon!” **35** Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he was known to them in the breaking of the bread.

- How do you define hope? How is it better than hopelessness and different from optimism?
- Read Luke 24:1-12. How did the women at the tomb respond to Jesus not being there? What does this say about the state of their hope?
- In Luke 24:21, the two men say, “But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel,” referring to Jesus. How was their expectation of Jesus different from the reality of Jesus?
- When our expectations differ from reality, how can that affect us?
- The resurrection of Jesus changed everything! Read Luke 24:24-27. Why do you think no one expected Jesus to rise from the dead, especially after he told them he would?
- As you think about the resurrection of Jesus, what are some of your greatest doubts?
- What is the strongest evidence that the resurrection of Jesus is historical fact?
- Why is the resurrection of Jesus the ultimate source of hope? Why does anything and everything else fall short of providing hope?
- Despite the hope the resurrection guarantees, we sometimes can struggle to believe it or make it our own. How can we remind ourselves on a consistent basis of the hope we have because of the resurrection of Jesus?
